When something isn't right

- 3-5% of pregnancies have a genetic or congenital abnormality
- Standard obstetric care offers screening and imaging to detect and abnormalities
- When a concern is noted, a referral to a maternal fetal medicine/fetal center is often the next step



Maternal/Fetal Care

- Significant advances in care (both from a diagnostic and intervention standpoint) over the past several decades
- Focus on care of the pregnant patient as well as the health of the fetus and postnatal care are considered
- Care offered varies from center to center (i.e. screening and consultation and/or intervention)



Fetal Care

- 1981-first fetal surgery in U.S.
- 1988-first fetal laser ablation (Twin to Twin Transfusion Syndrome)
- 2011-Open fetal surgery for Myelomeningocele (Spina Bfida)
- Centers vary on services and procedures offered



The Fetal Center

- Prenatal consultations have been occurring for over 20 years
- · Collaboration with local MFM and OB offices
- Nurse coordinator joining with champion physicians in various specialty services



The Fetal Center

- February 2021-expansion began to include additional nurse coordinator, MFM, fetal surgeon, sonographer, intake coordinator
- Expansion continued with social worker, nurse practitioner, OB nurse team, additional sonographers, MFM, administrative and leadership staff



The Fetal Center

- Outpatient fetal MRI, echocardiogram, and ultrasound
- · Multidisciplinary prenatal consultation
- 4 bed inpatient OB unit for fetal interventions and post-partum care
- Active team from The Fetal Center and Neonatology for on-site deliveries
- · Simulation and Education



Developing the social work role

- · Where to begin?
- Considerations for outpatient and inpatient care
- · Triage for acuity and need
- · Overlap of roles
- · Consideration for existing services



Comprehensive social work services

- · Psychosocial assessments
- · Trauma informed care
- Mitigating barriers (insurance, transportation)
- · Connecting to resources
- · Multidisciplinary consultation
- · Anticipatory guidance, inpatient tour
- Collaboration with primary OB/MFM providers
- · Coordination of services for delivery and inpatient care
- · Warm hand-offs to NICUs, CTICU, Palliative Care



Barriers to care

- · Navigating the steps for referral
- Transportation
- Communication
- Time commitment
- · Options for intervention
 - Relocation
 - Long-term care



Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

- LGBTQIA+
- · Language and cultural considerations
- Family Dynamics
- · Racial disparities
- · Socioeconomic status
- · Health Literacy



Screening for Safety

- Edinburgh Postnatal Depression Scale
- · IPV and home safety
- Stress and Resiliency screen
- Collaboration with psychology/specialty social work



Preparing for postnatal care

- Resources
- · Logistical considerations
 - Tour of the inpatient unit
 - Hospital amenities
 - Ronald McDonald House
- · Integrating into the medical team
- Outpatient follow-up
- Financial considerations



Challenges

- Adult patients in a freestanding pediatric hospital
- · Maternal mental health crises
- · Adjustment for staff
- Inpatient vs. outpatient goals
- Setting up warm hand-offs



Research Opportunities

- Social Determinants of Health (SDOH) (a retrospective study)
 - Prenatal diagnosis of myelomeningocele
 - Evaluating past patients and eligibility for fetal intervention and if common SDOH factors are identified
 - Considerations for future patients



Into the Future

- · Expansion continues with additional staff
- Consider social work role and possibilities for additional needs
- Continued advancements in possible interventions
- · Opportunities for publication, research
